

Traditional paper lanterns for Obon





Yame's paper lanterns, made from Yame's own handmade Japanese paper, are decorated with flowers, birds and landscapes. Since the Taisho period (1912-1926), these elegantly crafted lanterns have held a major share of the Obon lantern market.



Now, artisans are using traditional lantern-making techniques to develop handbags and other new products.

Yame Handmade Paper The paper of choice of many artists





Locally sourced mulberry, which has longer fibers than other plants, yields tough yet elegant handmade paper, Yame handmade paper was the pape of choice of the famous printmaker Shiko Munakata.



Yame handmade paper is used for lacquered papier-mâché and shoji paper screens, and with some additional processing, it can also be used to make stylish

Kurume-gasuri

This area is famous for the dark navy Kurume-gasuri textiles, but weavers make many other colorful combinations as well.



Yame Pottery Numerous kilns, each making unique pieces, can be found in the Yame area.



Hoshino-yaki pottery

[Prefecturally Designated Specialty Craft] These are the arrows of choice for many traditional kyudo archers. They are renowned throughout Japan for their beautiful design and for flying straight and true.



(Hoshino)

Hoshino-yaki pottery flourished in the Edo period under the patronage of the Kurume Clan. Even today, Hoshino remains a highly regarded style of pottery.



Ganzuki-vaki Gozen-gama (Yabe)

An up-and-coming pottery kiln run by Shinichi Fuchinoue.



Onoko-yaki pottery (Tachibana)

Onoko-yaki pottery began about 400 years ago when the head of the Yanagawa Clan brought some pieces back from the Korean Peninsula. For the next 80 years, it served as the official kiln of the clan.



Tanikawa Plum Orchard MAP D-4 Tachibana is one of the biggest plum producing regions in Kyushu. This spacious, hilly orchard spans 80 hectares and is home to about 30,000 white plum trees. It attracts numerous visitors every year.



Rhododendron Park MAPH-4 When in season, nearly 10,000 rhododendrons of different varieties burst into bloom on a hillside. This popular spot also has walking paths, so you can come here to enjoy a leisurely stroll.



Kurogi Ofuji MAP E-4 Susanoo Shrine is home to the Kurogi Ofuji, a wisteria arbor spanning about 3,000 m2. Every year in mid-April, the purple flowers begin to bloom, and some of them grow to longer than



Fireflies MAP D-3 Fireflies light up the night sky in early summer. You can enjoy large numbers of the glowing insects in the bucolic Joyomachi district.



Mt. Gozen & Mt. Shaka MAPI-5-J-5 People flock from all over Kyushu to hike one or both of these peaks and enjoy breathtaking views from the summits. A system of trails connects the two mountains.



Yame Chuo Tea Plantation MAP D-3 This massive carpet of green tea fields is the symbol of Yame. On a clear day, you can see downtown Yame and the Ariake Sea in the distance.



Fall Foliage at Yame Tsuhime Shrine MAPH-6 In early November, shrine-goers from the Kaminoiwaya district hold the Momiji (maple leaf) Festival on the grounds of Yame Tsuhime Shrine and adjacent museum.



Hyugami Reservoir, a scenic man-made lake with unique rock formations, is a well-known spot for viewing cherry blossoms.



The Yabe River meanders slowly from its source in Yabe Village through Yame City before emptying into the Ariake Sea. Stroll down the riverside walking paths in spring to enjoy the yellow expanses of field mustard.



Night Sky in Hoshino Village Hoshi no Bunkakan (Star Culture Center) is home to one of Kyushu's largest telescopes, measuring 65 cm in diameter. When the weather is clear, you can view bright stars like Vega even during the daytime.



Heart Rock MAPH-5 Legend has it that the gods of Hyuga (modern day Miyazaki) were drawn to Hyugami Gorge by its natural beauty, which is exemplified by Heart Rock, Japan's biggest heart-shaped rock and well-known power spot.


